Hurricane Season - Be Prepared!

urricanes are a threat to Palm Beach County and preparing for them is a year-round process. Each year, on average, ten (10) tropical storms, of which six (6) become hurricanes, develop over the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea, or Gulf of Mexico.

A Tropical Storm is an organized system of strong thunderstorms with a defined circulation and maximum sustained winds of 39 to 73 mph (34-63 knots).

A Hurricane is an intense tropical weather system with a well-defined circulation and maximum sustained winds of 74 mph (64 knots) or higher.

Moving ashore, they sweep the ocean inward while spawning tornadoes and producing torrential rains and floods. Many of these remain over the ocean; however, about five hurricanes strike the United States coastline every three years. Of these five, two will be major hurricanes, Category 3 (winds above 111 miles per hour) or greater on the Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Scale.

Hurricane season is June 1 through November 30; however, hurricanes can occur outside this time frame. Colorado State University provides the hurricane season forecasts. The 2010 hurricane season is predicted to be more active than the average for the 1950-2000 seasons. The early forecast report estimates approximately 11-16 named storms, 6-8 hurricanes and 3-5 major hurricanes occurring during the 2010 Atlantic hurricane season.

Hurricanes can cause major damage to buildings, trees, and power lines due to high winds and flying debris. Heavy rain can flood buildings and close roadways. Residents and businesses need to be prepared and have a plan to survive a hurricane.

Communities can cope with and recover from the aftermath of a hurricane if each resident and business take individual responsibility for planning and preparedness. Being prepared means having a plan and knowing what to do before, during, and after a hurricane moves through an area.

The information presented here is intended to provide a general overview of actions to be taken as part of planning and preparation. Before the Season Begins

During a Watch/Warning

Make a Plan Make a family plan. Who does what and where will your family ride out the storm. Establish an out-of-state contact to call in case of emergency. Purchase supplies for your family disaster supply kit; (5-7 days of food, water, and medicine; flashlight, extra batteries, radio, cash, and first aid kit). See www.ready.gov/america/getakit. Know the disaster plan of your child's school or day-Make plans to board your pet if you plan to go to a shelter. Locate your water meter and electrical shutoff. Trim trees to make them more wind resistant. Purchase materials to protect windows. Use a video camera to record the contents of your home and store videotape with a friend who lives out of town. Generator Safety According to the Centers for Disease Control, over 500 people die each year from accidental Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning. Many of these deaths could have been avoided if the following safety guidelines were followed: Never use a portable generator indoors; only use a portable generator outside and away from any doors or windows or vents that could allow CO to enter your Do not use a portable generator in the rain; consumergrade generators are not weatherproof and there is a risk of electrocution or shock. Follow the manufacturer's instructions; plug appliances into heavy-duty extension cords and then plug the cords into the generator. Purchase a carbon monoxide detector and ensure the unit is functioning correctly. Never power the house wiring by plugging the generator into a wall outlet; this is called "backfeeding" and presents a serious risk to both utility workers and neighbors

served by the same transformer.

Stay Informed

	Listen to NOAA Weather Radio or local radio or TV stations for instructions.
	Review your family plan. Decide where to ride out the storm.
4	If you are going to stay during a hurricane you need to ensure that you have sufficient food, water, medicine, and supplies for at least 5-7 days.
	Check family disaster supply kit and gather any missing items.
0	Place important documents and photos in waterproof plastic bags.
	Obtain cash or travelers checks.
	Fuel up vehicles and propane tanks; obtain fuel for generators.
	Move vehicle(s) into a garage or next to a building; avoid parking near trees and utility poles. Tie down or stabilize boat.
	Secure all doors and windows. Install shutters. Brace garage door. Remove roof turbine and cap vent hole.
	Secure/move outdoor furniture items such as wind chimes, flags, trash cans; anchor grills, antennas, etc.
	Secure recycling containers and close lids of dumpsters.
	Fill water containers, bath tub and sinks. Freeze water jugs and fill ice chest.
	Turn refrigerator to lowest setting and lower A/C (turn their circuit breakers off after power goes out).
	Test generator (do not operate during storm).
	Ensure the inlets in the roads and parking areas in your community are not clogged with a buildup of leaves or debris on the surface.
	If you leave, allow at least twice the usual travel time. Take photo ID and proof of address.
Addi	tional Information for Homeowners Associations
	Confirm arrangements for debris/vegetation removal with landscaping company or contractor.
	Establish contact list of board members/management company.
	Clean drainage systems including inlets, pipes, and outfall structures.
	Compile list of residents that may need assistance before and after a hurricane.
	Install shutters on common area buildings (i.e. clubhouse).

Note:

Remove or secure loose items on common property.

Secure recycling containers and close lids of dumpsters.

Waste services will cease when the SWA closes the landfills (approximately 12-24 hours prior to a storm).
