Rainy Season Readiness

South Florida's annual rainy season occurs between June and October during which our region sees 70% of its annual rainfall causing many communities to see flooding. Damage from flooding causes physical and environmental impacts, and the cost for correcting the damage is always high. Prevention of stormwater problems through proper maintenance is far easier and less expensive than correcting them.



Florida's drainage and flood control is through a complex network of canals and water control structures that convey excess water into regional storage areas or out to the ocean. The path of stormwater begins in the neighborhoods and commercial plazas and travels to city, county or local drainage district canals and finally to South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) canals or natural rivers. As a result of this interconnected drainage system, flood control in South Florida is a shared responsibility between the District, County and city governments, local drainage districts, homeowners associations and residents. The majority of private property owners are responsible for their own stormwater management system. Failure to provide proper maintenance reduces the pollutant removal efficiency and the systems overall flow capacity.

Things Homeowners Associations can do to keep their stormwater systems functioning properly include:

- ~ Know how your stormwater system works. Be aware of the location, condition and operation of all facilities that you are responsible for maintaining.
- ~ Keep all stormwater inlets, pipes, and culverts clean and free of debris. The grates should be kept unobstructed and any sediment, trash or debris in the inlets or pipes should be removed.
- ~ Swales and grassed areas tend to fill in with vegetation and sediment over time. It is important to mow swales regularly and to keep them clear of yard waste, clippings or vegetation.
- ~ Stabilize eroded areas in ditches and canals with appropriate materials such as sod or plantings. The existing slopes and dimensions should be compared against the original design.
- ~ Remove any accumulated dead vegetation, trash, and debris from all lakes. Erosion or washouts should be repaired or vegetated. Outfall pipes should be open and clear.
- ~ Conduct routine inspections on all outfall structures to make sure no obstructions are present or repairs are needed. Trash or vegetation should be removed.

The following are highlights of actions taken by the City Council at their meetings from January through June, 2012.

- ~ Approved the annexation of 3.14 acres located at 4761 Myrtle Drive.
- ~ Approved the annexation of the Exxon Service Station located on 0.473 acres at 4025 South Military Trail.
- ~ Approved a Special Exception for the Palm Beach Soccer Club to be located at 5353 Lake Worth Road.
- ~ Authorized amendments to the 2010 Florida Building Code and 2012 Greenacres Property Maintenance Code.
- ~ Approved a Special Exception for the AT&T Cell Tower located at 6250 Purdy Lane to add an emergency generator.
- ~ Authorized the execution of an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Atlantis to provide fire rescue services effective October 1, 2012.
- ~ Authorized the execution of an Interlocal Agreement with Palm Beach County for Information Technology Network Services.
- ~ Authorized the FY 2013 School Readiness Agreement and the CTCA Afterschool Service Agreement with the Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County that provides monthly reimbursement to the City for participants in the City's Afterschool Program.
- ~ Approved the execution of two Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) Agreements for enhancement of the Villa Del Trio storm drainage system and enhancement of the A & B Canals.

FY 2013 Proposed City Budget

The City Council scheduled public hearings on September 10th and 19th at 7:00 p.m. to adopt a budget for Fiscal Year 2013 (*October 1, 2012 – September 30, 2013*). The City's proposed general operating budget for FY 2013 is \$20.5 million, which is just \$51,000 more than the current budget. The proposed budget reflects adjustments to offset the 4.67% decline in existing property values.

The proposed tax rate of 5.65 mills, which is the same as the current rate, represents a 4.4% reduction in the amount of property tax revenue collected or approximately \$288,000 less than last year's revenue. Millage is the tax rate levied by a city on taxable property per each \$1,000 of assessed taxable value. To make up for the deficit, the City is using several approaches that include continuing implementation of various cost cutting measures and using the budget stabilization reserve. At the proposed tax rate of 5.65 mills, the total property tax collection will be \$6.17 million or \$162 per capita which is approximately \$10 per capita less than FY 2012. The proposed tax rate represents a 4.8% drop below the rolled-back rate which is the millage rate that would produce the same amount of tax revenue as the previous year.

Each August, the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser's Office sends a Notice of Proposed Property Taxes to all property owners showing the taxable value of the property and the property tax information for all taxing authorities.

Of the total property tax bill, the City's property tax portion represents approximately 22% with the remaining 78% going to the County, School District, and other independent taxing authorities.

Animal and Wildlife Information

Human activities can attract certain wildlife species looking for an easy meal or shelter. Unfortunately, this can bring them into conflict with the interests of people, and the wildlife can be considered to be a nuisance. Nuisance animals, pests, and stray animals can cause property damage and may present a threat to public safety. If improper interactions with humans occur, such as feeding or providing shelter, any animal can become a nuisance to the community.

Muscovy Ducks are not domestic animals and should be left to forage for their food naturally. These ducks are not protected by State wildlife regulations, but they do fall within State animal cruelty laws (Sec. 828.12, Florida Statutes). The City of Greenacres strongly recommends that people **DO NOT** feed the ducks. Their natural diet is comprised of vegetation and insects—both of which are abundant in our tropical climate. Additionally, feeding by humans makes the ducks reliant on such hand-outs and too lazy to continue foraging for their natural dietary items.



The same is true with **Raccoons, Birds, and Squirrels**. So as to avoid messes from uninvited guests, residents are encouraged to keep lids on their trash cans and keep them in a secure area where access is limited.

Mosquito Population Control

It is inevitable that mosquitoes will make their presence known to anyone that finds themselves near standing water. The Public Works Department has coordinated the eradication of mosquitoes and their larvae with the Palm Beach County Mosquito Control Division for the treatment of all City maintained alleyways, lakes, retention ponds, and detention ponds using environmentally friendly chemical treatment, hormonal and bacterial larvaciding and other biological controls. The goal of this application is to enhance the comfort, health, and quality of life for City residents. Residents can also take advantage of this service to treat standing water at their residences or at adjacent homes that have been abandoned. Mosquitoes are active during twilight hours and at night; however, around the home, the mosquitoes that breed in discarded containers are active during the day. Mosquitoes need water to complete their life cycle; they can breed in almost any source of water. Here are just a few tips to eliminate mosquito breeding around your property:

- ~ Remove standing water in old tires, buckets, drums, or any other containers
- ~ Check clogged gutters and flat roofs that may have poor drainage
- ~ Cover barrels and trash containers tightly with a lid or with a mesh screen
- ~ Empty plastic wading pools and bird baths often and level the ground around your home so water can run off
- ~ Fill in holes or depressions near your home that collect water
- ~ Try a bacterial insecticide (*available at local retail stores*) specific to mosquitoes



By observing the recommendations above, everyone can not only be a better neighbor and wildlife enthusiast, but also be proud to be a citizen who is personally helping to keep our City clean and safe!

KEEPING IT 'Green' in GREENACRES - Tree City USA!

The Arbor Day Foundation recently announced that Greenacres, FL was named a Tree City USA community for its commitment to urban forestry. The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service.

It is the 20th year Greenacres has earned this national honor from the Arbor Day Foundation, the nation's largest nonprofit organization dedicated to planting trees. *"We all benefit when communities like Greenacres place a high priority on planting and caring for trees, one of our nation's most beautiful resources,"* said John Rosenow, Chief Executive and founder of the Arbor Day Foundation. *"Trees shade our homes and add beauty to our neighborhoods, and they also provide many environmental, economic and social benefits. We applaud Greenacres' elected officials, volunteers and citizens for providing vital care for its urban forest."*



Protecting Water Quality

The City of Greenacres cares about the stormwater management system and the quality of water entering and leaving our area. You can help us maintain quality standards by reporting illicit connections to the city. Illicit connections are discharges of any pollutants into the stormwater system, including pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, sewage, chemicals and oil. Stormwater runoff results when rain falls on surfaces that cannot absorb it, such as pavement or rooftops, or ground that is already saturated from rain. This rain flows over land toward stormwater inlets, swales, ditches, canals, lakes, wetlands, or coastal waters. Most of the unwanted pollutants that end up on our water bodies come from human activities.

Maintaining the Quality of Our Water

- ✓ Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When using these chemicals, use the recommended amounts and only when necessary.
- ✓ Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- ✓ Don't leave compost or mulch yard waste in the street or sweep it into storm drains or waterways.
- ✓ Don't over-water your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- ✓ Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used for landscaping projects.
- ✓ Purchase biodegradable, non-toxic products.
- ✓ Use, store, and dispose of products as directed on the container.
- ✓ Sweep up and properly dispose of any construction debris.
- ✓ Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface.
- ✓ Check your vehicle regularly for leaks and/or spills. Clean up and properly dispose of materials used for spill cleanup. Repair leaks as soon as possible to prevent future spills.
- ✓ Always pick up after your pet...even in your own yard!
- ✓ Take the time to educate others on the negative impact of dumping into a stormwater system.

Capital Improvements Projects (CIP)

Public Safety Headquarters: Renovations to the site of Public Safety Headquarters on Jog Road to improve the safety and appearance of the property was completed on January 13, 2012. The work included repaving and restriping the parking lot in conformity with City Code and ADA requirements, installing additional parking lot lights, installing a security fence and gates, constructing a larger dumpster and recycling enclosure, constructing a handicap accessible sidewalk from Jog Road to the Public Safety building entry, and installing landscaping along the south side of Public Safety Headquarters and westwards up to Liberty Park Elementary School.



Exterior Painting of Public Buildings: This project provided for the exterior maintenance, weather proofing and painting of various public buildings. Age, usage, maintenance and repairs, and color-fading are taken into account as part of the analysis to determine when each facility will be painted. Public Safety Station 2, which was originally painted in August 2002, was repainted in March 2012.



Villa Del Trio Improvements: The project provided a comprehensive solution in the Villa Del Trio sub-division (*S. 37th Street, S. 37th Court, and S. 38th Street*) to address sidewalk damage from the Live Oak tree roots and increase the length of the driveways such that cars would not block sidewalks. City staff discussed the issues and identified solutions for vehicular traffic. The following steps were identified and completed in three (3) phases: Pruning the crowns of 147 Live Oak trees; Pruning the tree roots, Repairing uplifted sidewalks and driveways; and Re-striping the streets.



Haverhill Road and Melaleuca Lane Medians: Landscaping work on the median of Haverhill Road south of MacArthur Palm Trail was completed in March 2012, and the median on Melaleuca Lane east of Fire Sky Drive / Pine Glen Lane was completed in May 2012. The Haverhill Road median work included the installation of canopy trees, shrubs, irrigation, sod, the relocation of the City entry sign southwards, and installation of a light for the sign.



The Melaleuca Lane median work included the installation of palm trees and drought resistant shrubs. The landscaping will improve safety by visually demarcating the medians and discouraging improper vehicle access and will improve the aesthetics of the community.

Greenacres receives Distinguished Budget Award

The City of Greenacres has received the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the Fiscal Year 2012 Budget. The City has received this award for the 19th year in a row.



The award represents a significant achievement by the City and reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, the City had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well an entity's budget serves as: A Policy Document, An Operations Guide, A Financial Plan, and A Communications Device.

The GFOA's Distinguished Budget Presentation Awards Program is the only national awards program in governmental budgeting. Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all four (4) categories to receive the award. When a Distinguished Budget Presentation Award is granted, a Certificate of Recognition for Budget Presentation is also presented to the individual or department designated as being primarily responsible for its having achieved the award. This has been presented to the City of Greenacres, Department of Finance. Congratulations!

Fire Safety - Preventative Measures

Many preventative and simple measures are unfortunately overlooked and every year more than 350,000 homes in the U.S. are struck by fire. There were 81 structure fires in the City last year that caused damage to homes. There are easy steps you can take to reduce the chance that your home will be damaged or anyone injured in a blaze-whether it starts inside or outside your home. The following are some tips for fire safety:

- ~ **Install Smoke Detectors and Fire Extinguishers:** Install smoke detectors on every level of your home. THEN... test detectors every month and check fire extinguisher pressure gauges.
- ~ **Plan Your Escape from Fire:** Prepare for a fire emergency by sitting down with your family and agreeing on an escape plan.
- ~ **Keep an Eye on Smokers:** Careless smoking is the leading cause of fire deaths in North America.
- ~ **Cook Carefully:** Never leave cooking unattended.
- ~ **Give Space Heaters Space:** Keep portable heaters and space heaters at least three feet from anything that can burn.
- ~ **Remember:** Matches and lighters are tools, not toys. In a child's hand, matches and lighters can be deadly.
- ~ **Clean lint screen in clothes dryer before each use.**
- ~ **Electrical Safety:** If an electrical appliance smokes or has an unusual smell, unplug it immediately, then have it serviced before using it again.

If you do have a situation where you are in a fire or get burned:

- ~ **Cool A Burn:** Run cool water over a burn for 10-15 minutes. Never use ice.
- ~ **Crawl Low Under Smoke:** Smoke and poisonous gases rise with the heat. The air is cleaner near the floor.
- ~ **Stop, Drop and Roll:** If your clothes catch fire, don't run. Stop where you are, drop to the ground, cover your face with your hands, and roll over and over to smother the flames.






