National Flood Insurance Program:

Greenacres

Flood Hazard Mapping - What you should know

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), through its Flood Hazard Mapping Program, identifies flood hazards and assesses flood risks to provide data which is an important part of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

FEMA maintains and updates data through Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) and risk assessments to create flood hazard maps that outline a community's different flood risk areas. A FIRM is the official map that shows Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) and the risk premium zones applicable to a community. Risk zones indicated on FIRMs provide a basis for establishing flood insurance coverage premium rates offered through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

FEMA has been working on updating the flood hazard data for all areas in Palm Beach County and provided this preliminary data to the County and Cities for review. The Preliminary data includes new or revised Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRMs), Flood Insurance Study (FIS) reports, and FIRM Databases. The preliminary data for the City of Greenacres shows that many areas north of Lake Worth Road now contain Special Flood Hazard Areas that were not previously shown on flood maps. The City questioned the accuracy of the FEMA flood maps since all subdivisions built in compliance with the South Florida Water Management Requirements have finished floor elevations above the 100 year flood stage. FEMA responded by indicating that changes will need to be made using their process of amending the flood maps. FEMA will be hosting public open house meetings in various locations in Palm Beach County for the public to view the preliminary flood maps and ask questions. City Council Actions

The following are highlights of actions taken by the City Council at their meetings from January through June, 2014.

- Received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting and outstanding achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association.
- Adopted a zoning text amendment updating the City Code relating to Off-Street Parking and Loading Regulations.
- Awarded a bid for the renovations to the Community Hall to Hartzell Construction in the amount of \$432,236.00.
- Authorized an Interlocal Agreement with Palm Beach County for reimbursement of emergency medical services equipment in the amount of \$68,000.00.
- Awarded the 2013 President's Volunteer Service Awards to seventeen (17) volunteers that donated their time, energy and care to the community serving a total of 3,159.75 hours.
- Approved a Special Exception and Site Plan to allow for a planned unit development of 73 homes to be located on the west side of Ranchette Road immediately south of Summit Boulevard.

Hours of Operation/Holidays

- Approved a Site Plan for Harvest Pines, a single family subdivision consisting of 35 homes to be located on the south side of Melaleuca Lane at 5650 Melaleuca Lane.
- Approved the annexation of two (2) parcels of land totaling approximately 5.114 acres, located on the north side of Bowman Street at 4924 – 2nd Street.
- Presented five (5) Educational Scholarship Awards to resident students as recommended by the City's Scholarship Committee.
- Authorized the FY2015 School Readiness Agreement and the Children's Services Council (CSC) Scholarship Program Provider Agreement with the Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County for the City's Afterschool Program.
- Authorized the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Palm Beach County to enable the City to participate in the Palm Beach County Department of Economic Sustainability (DES) Urban County Program for Fiscal Years 2015, 2016 and 2017.
- Approved the committee recommendation for the selection of the Architectural/Engineering Consultant for the Community Center Expansion.

Proposed City Budget - FY2015

The City Council scheduled public hearings on September 9th and 15th at 7:00 p.m. to adopt a budget for Fiscal Year 2015 (*October 1, 2014 – September 30, 2015*). The City's proposed general operating budget for FY 2015 is \$22.2 million, which is just \$1,205,000 higher than the current budget.

The proposed FY 2015 budget maintains the property tax millage rate at the current level of 5.4284 mills which will generate total property tax collection of \$6.61 million or \$173 per capita. Millage is the tax rate levied by a city on taxable property per each \$1,000 of assessed taxable value.

Each August, the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser's Office sends a Notice of Proposed Property Taxes to all property owners showing the taxable value of the property and the property tax information for all taxing authorities. Of the total property tax bill, the City's property tax portion represents approximately 22% with the remaining 78% going to the County, School District, and other independent taxing authorities.

What qualifies as an abandoned vehicle?	Motor vehicles that are left unattended for more than 24 hours on City rights-of-way are considered abandoned. Parking in the swale area is permitted, but prohibited if "No Parking" signs are posted. Click here to report an abandoned vehicle.
What services does the City bill?	 The City handles billing for the following: Garbage Collection / Recycling Collection False fire and burglar alarms Ambulance transports The City of Greenacres does not currently offer online payment for these services. What is the schedule for garbage/recycling collection?	The City's Contractor, Advanced Disposal Services Solid Waste SE (formerly known as Veolia Environmental Services), provides four (4) categories of pickup services depending on the neighborhood type. All solid waste services are conducted from 7 a.m 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday (except Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day). Please make sure to place your waste outside prior to 7 a.m., for prompt collection. To see your neighborhood, type of pickup, and the days the pickups are conducted, see the Solid Waste Schedule of Pickups on our website. Residential customers are encouraged to call the City of Greenacres Public Works Department at (561) 642-2071 with any complaints, issues, or concerns related to the pick-up and disposal of solid waste.
How can I report a traffic signal malfunction or outage?	All traffic signals within the City of Greenacres are owned, operated and maintained by Palm Beach County. What Green really means

You do not have to be an environmentalist to appreciate living in a healthy and durable environment that will serve future generations. Enjoying benefits of green practices requires choosing products, designs and practices that work together to perform efficiently for a long time to come. Green practices are not just for adults, children can do their part too. In their own ways, their small efforts can make a big difference. It takes proper guidance and lots of patience to impart the true meaning of this advocacy. There is no better place to learn green practices that will assist in the effort:

- Optimizing energy settings for computers, tablets, gaming and mobile devices can be more than a modest energy saver. Set electronics to energysaving settings and make sure to shut them down when not in use.
- Purchase and use biodegradable soaps and recycled paper or cloth towels in the bathroom and kitchen to reduce carbon footprint around the home. When brushing teeth, teach kids to use a cup for water instead of just letting the faucet water continuously flow.
- Encouraging little ones to sleep without lights can be a big challenge;

purchase low wattage night lights or consider purchasing lamps with child friendly lampshade designs. Instead of turning on a cluster of lights, switch on the lampshade while kids sleep.

- Train children to dispose of their garbage properly. Place trash and recycling bins in your kitchen and in different sections of the house so it will be easier for them to find.
- Purchase pens and pencils made of recycled materials and refillable pens and markers.

If you want your kids to learn simple means of going green, you should use patience. They may not be able to fully understand the logic behind these practices, but forming good green habits will help them in the future.

Recycling

Recycling preserves natural resources, saves energy, reduces waste and increases the life of landfills. Residents are encouraged to pitch in and do their part whether they are at home, at work, or at play. The City of Greenacres provides residential recycling bins free of charge and has a recycling program implemented at all City parks and buildings.

- Processing mills and aluminum buyers for the Solid Waste Authority NO LONGER ACCEPT aluminum foil and pie plates as recyclable material, so please throw these items into the gargage. These items will now likely be processed at the Renewable Energy Facility and turned into electricity.



Crime Prevention

Family Guide for using the Internet

The internet can be a wonderful learning tool for children and youth today, especially with their daily activities such as:

Homework: To find the most current news, encyclopedias, and other source materials containing information for research projects.

Communication: Use email and public message boards to keep in touch with family and friends.

Entertainment and Education: The internet can be used to take college courses, play games, etc.

However, the internet can also be dangerous. Here are some precautions families can take to encourage today's computer savvy young people to be computer safe:

Using the Computer is a Family Affair

Agree on a list of rules and post it by the computer. The rules should cover how long children can spend on the Internet, and how late they can surf the Web. What they may or may not visit on the Web and whether or not they are allowed to make purchases over the Web. Talk to your kids. Keep the lines of communication open. If a child tells you about an upsetting event experienced online, don't blame him or her. How you react will affect how much he or she shares with you in the future.

Meeting People Online

Teach your children about the dangers of meeting strangers online. As a general rule, children should never plan to meet anybody in person whom they encountered online. Explain that people online may not be who they say they are. Children should never give out personal information about themselves over the Internet. Children should use an online name not their real name. They should never reveal their address, telephone number, or any identifying information. No pictures, letters, or telephone calls should be exchanged with online acquaintances without parents permission. Parents should monitor this type of activity. If online acquaintances send your children an email that make them uncomfortable or they know is obscene, they should inform you at once. The same should apply to information they see on message boards or chat rooms.

Making Online Purchases

Children need to learn to be savvy consumers. The term *free* doesn't always mean free. Con-artists use the term to attract more business. Children should ask you before signing up for anything over the Internet. Encourage an attitude of healthy skepticism toward websites that offer prizes or giveaways. Chances are, all the child has won is the opportunity to buy something he or she did not want in the first place. Establish rules for getting clearance for online purchases, including documentation to be kept.

Downloading from the Internet

The Internet has changed the way children do schoolwork, but they need to realize that information they find on the Internet is not all free. It is against the law to copy or download some types of information or music from the Internet without permission. Be cautious of downloads as some may contain viruses. If you download from a Website make sure it is from a secure and reputable Website.


